I worked at that for about 20 years and I was on the board there,” said Velma. “I’ve done a lot of church work as well as things with my kids like Boy and Girl Scouts. I did all the regular things that mothers used to do.”

Chuck, Walnut Village’s marketing director, used to call Velma the “Queen Bee”. “I kind of got after him so he doesn’t call me that so much anymore,” commented Velma as she laughed.

Walnut Village’s opening was perfect timing for Velma and her husband. They moved into their apartment on June 4, 2004. “My husband was not well and I needed help. Walnut Village was just opening then so I was one of the original people to move in. They are very pleasant people to be around. The food is good and I am very lazy,” Velma said with a chuckle.

Walnut Village: School to Senior Living

The buildings located on 613 Walnut Street have seen many different settings over the years. From middle and high school students, to retired citizens and their loved ones visiting, Walnut Village Assisted Living and Senior Apartments has an extensive history.

In 1916, a three-story brick building was constructed which was to be used as the Yankton High School. From the beginning of this landmark, many important milestones have occurred. Even the election to create it was historical.

“The city election required to construct the school building was the first time women were allowed to vote in Yankton,” said Lois Varvel, Yankton historian.

Leonard Tacke has fond memories of the building when it was a high school. “I attended Yankton High School in the mid-40s,” he said. “I remember we had study hall in the library which is now Walnut Village’s Great Room and we would sit up on the stage and pull the curtains a little bit and play cards instead of study.”

In the spring of 1958, Tom Brokaw was among the last class to graduate from Yankton High School in the current Walnut Village building.

The building located to the south of Walnut Village was built in 1927 and was used as the Yankton High School auditorium. Many historical activities took place there. State basketball championships were played, Lawrence Welk’s Orchestra rented the building for a public dance, and many famous

musical groups performed there including The Chicago Opera Ballet Company, the Belafonte Folk Singers, and the Vienna Choir Boys.

Walnut Village is currently using the auditorium for general storage. “I know we’re encouraged to watch the progress and I know they have plans for the future,” said Varvel.

“I’m interested to see what will happen with the gymnasium. It could turn into an exercise or spa center for seniors to do exercises on a daily basis.”

When the Yankton School District decided to put the old high school up for auction, Varvel launched a campaign to preserve the building, since it was scheduled for demolition if not sold.

“My plan was that the Dakota Territorial Museum would occupy a good share of what is now Walnut Village,” she said. “There would also be room for an art center and some of the individual classrooms could have been used as studios for individual artists.”

In 1998, Gary Blom attended the auction for the former Yankton High School buildings. "I bought the property for \$52,000 at auction. It was mainly because I didn't want to see the history of these old buildings destroyed," Gary said.

His wife, Casey Blom, feels the same way. "Initially I felt it was an investment but as the project progressed, I too wanted to preserve and restore the beauty of the buildings."

The Bloms saw a need in the community for a senior apartments building and the property seemed like a perfect fit. The main building housed 27 classrooms and 21 were remodeled into senior apartments. Others were used to create a game room, beauty shop, exercise room, and activity room.

The old high school's gym is now used for a dining and sitting area as well as a small chapel and shuffleboard room.

"Residents' family members say they argue over who gets to go eat lunch with Grandma at Walnut Village," said Casey Blom.

On the first floor, there are 18 assisted living apartments. What used to be the school's library is now Walnut Village's Great Room with reading and sitting areas.

"As soon as the first resident moved in, I switched my focus to making Walnut Village the best place possible for our elders

to be well cared for and for their families to enjoy the building as well," said Casey Blom. "Gary and I experienced our own children not comfortable at their great grandparents' apartments, so I wanted to make Walnut Village a family friendly environment. I believe we have accomplished that because more than once I have seen great grandchildren being dragged out of the building kicking and screaming because they wanted to stay longer."

In June 2002, the Walnut Village buildings were listed on the National Register of Historic Places as the "Yankton High School Historic District."
