How and When Did Halloween Originate?

The name "Halloween" comes from "All Hollows Eve," which came the night before "All Hollows Day," a Catholic celebration in honor of the saints. Many years before this holiday originated, the Celtic Irish celebrated October 31 as the end of the summer as well as the "New Year" and called it "samhain."

The Celtic people believed that on this eve the souls of those who had died during the past year would return in search of living bodies to possess. If they did not possess a living body they would have no chance at the afterlife. None of the living wanted to be possessed by these spirits, so they would put out all the lights in their homes, dress up in ghoulish costumes, and reek havoc in their neighborhood to scare the spirits away.

Halloween came to America during the 1840's as Irish immigrants fled Ireland's potato famine, but contrary to popular belief, this is not where trick-or-treating originated. Trick-or-treating comes from the European custom of "souling." The day after "All Hollows Day," Christians would walk from town to town begging for "soul cakes," which were pieces of bread baked with currants. The more "soul cakes" that were given to the beggars, the more prayers the beggars would promise to the donors. The Roman Catholics believed that the newly dead stayed in "limbo," and prayers could help the souls get to heaven faster.
